Undergraduate, lower division

GEOG 102: Introduction to Human Geography

This lecture course introduces students to human geography and its relevance to modern problems – especially global warming, and now the Covid-19 Pandemic. The course covers subfields in Human geography including environmental geography with sections on nature-society and the Covid-19 pandemic and the science and impacts of global warming. The economic geography section covers the geography of globalization, with an emphasis on how the global economy has evolved and how globalization impacts everyday life and global warming. New sections consider the impact of the pandemic on globalization. Part three examines political and cultural geography including debates about public memory, history, and territory, and electoral geographies. The last section examines contemporary urbanization both globally and in the US. It includes study of transport geography. Students are evaluated with short written assignments, reading quizzes, and traditional exams. Two field work observations are also assigned.

Undergraduate, upper division

GEOG 433* **: Geography of Urban Transportation

Geography of Urban Transportation is organized around understanding the interplay between mobility and global warming policies in California. It reviews transportation greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and other pollutants, and considers ways to mitigate harmful environmental and social impacts of transportation systems. The course is urban-focused because the world's cities consume a disproportionate amount of planetary resources and produce a tremendous amount of greenhouse gas emissions. Evaluation of students usually includes a final research paper and presentation, field trips, and exams.

GEOG 435* **: Geography of Global Transportation

Geography of Global Transportation is centered on the urgent problems of rapidly rising greenhouse gas emissions from transportation, coupled with a rapid rise in the number of automobiles worldwide. This is bringing increased congestion, pollution, noise, roadway deaths and fatalities associated with the "system of automobility," or a car-dominated mobility system with social, spatial, and temporal organization that suits the needs of cars. Evaluation of students usually includes a final research paper and presentation, field trips, and exams.

GEOG 437: Bicycle Geographies

The broad objective of this upper-division undergraduate course is to provide intellectual engagement with bicycling. The course examines bicycle planning, cultural, economic, and political dimensions to bicycling, including reviews of seminal works on bicycling theories and concepts, and a review of the planning literature. As part of CSU's "Campus as Living Lab Program," it is designed to help campus planners and policy makers understand and remove obstacles to bicycling, including physical, psychological, and cultural. The course includes a significant field component, with bicycle field trips (bicycles provided for those who need one).

GEOG 658*: Land Use Planning

Geography 658: Land Use Planning is normally organized around understanding the interplay between land use policy, built environments, and global warming. In California especially, but increasingly in other places around the world, land use policy is climate policy. The course reviews how land use can either increase or decrease greenhouse gas (GHG)

emissions and other pollutants depending on how cities are configured and organized. The thrust of the course is focused on ways to mitigate harmful environmental and social impacts of sprawl and other land use outcomes that increase emissions and inequity. Evaluation of students usually includes a final research paper and presentation, field trips, and exams.

GEOG 601/701: Qualitative and Field Methods in Human Geography

This class reviews contemporary qualitative research methodology and method. Students practice the use of qualitative research techniques such as participant observation, ethnography, textual and discourse analysis and interviewing. It includes new digital methods and examines current issues in qualitative methodology such as research ethics and power relations.

GEOG 820: Graduate Seminar in Human Geography

Title: Critical Cultural Geographies of Global Warming Mitigation, Land Use, and Transportation

This seminar examines cultural, social, and political dimensions of global warming, with an emphasis on mitigation through land use and transportation. For human geographers the seminar is designed to examine the interconnectedness of global warming with broader societal processes across numerous geographies. For physical geographers the course is designed to strengthen and enhance physical geographic knowledge through understanding how public policy shapes science. For techniques and GIS students the seminar is an opportunity to deploy critical approaches to mapping and other techniques for research on the human dimension of global warming. Students are evaluated with a semester research paper and presentation, and weekly leading or contributing to seminar discussion.
